Question	
Q1	This is a picture (view) of the Isle of Wight taken from space by a camera on a satellite and is called a satellite map. Make the map bigger by zooming in to it and see if you can find the place where your school is.
Q2	Each of the orange pins on the map marks a place on the Island (like your school) connected to the story of an object from history. These objects, often called artefacts and documents, tell us something about science inventors and innovation connected with the Isle of Wight.  Click on a pin on the coast near the sea to select an object.  Write down what the object is you have found:  What am I?  Your answer:
Q3	Click on a pin in the middle of the Island away from the sea to select another object.  Write down what the object is you have found:  What am I?  Your answer:





Each of the objects tell us something about science inventors and innovation on the Island throughout history. Q4 Click on the orange pins on the map and find an artefact or document that links to each of the six areas of innovation below, and for each: 1. Write down its name 2. Write down what it is made of 3. Draw a small picture.
